**ELIGIBILITY:**

Contestants may enter ONE piece of Star Wars fan fiction. Writing prompt attached.

Writing must be original.

Entries may be handwritten, or typed. Handwritten entries MUST be legible in order to be considered for judging.

There is no minimum length or maximum length for entries, however only the first 6 pages will be judged if entries are longer.

Warsaw Community Public Library has the right to refuse to display an entry based upon questionable content. Please be advised that writings of a graphic nature will not be eligible to win the contest.

**RECEIVING:**

Writers must deliver their work during library hours June 1-29. Please bring the entries to the Adult Reference Desk. Entries may also be submitted online by emailing them to [teen@warsawlibrary.org](mailto:teen@warsawlibrary.org)

**Entries will not be accepted after midnight June 30, 2019 by email. (Paper entries must be submitted by June 29. The library closes at 2:00 pm.)**

**JUDGING:**

Judging will take place in July. Entrants will be divided by age groups into Children, Teens, and Adults. Prizes will be awarded in each category.

**DISPLAY:**

Fanfiction will be displayed at the library through July for any community member who wishes to read it. Displayed entries may not be removed before 8:00 pm on July 31 without permission from the WCPL Teen Librarian.

**NOTIFICATION:**

A list of the winners will be posted on the library Facebook page. Contest winners will be notified by phone or e-mail.

**PICK UP:**

If contestants want their entries back, they may be picked up at the Reference Desk, beginning in August.
